
## **Knit Happens**



Kathryn loved nature so small pieces of glass depict water, trees, rainbows and the sun. They were hung carefully to catch the light as it enters the sanctuary.

#### Yard & Bake Sale

On Saturday, September 6<sup>th</sup>, we once again joined in with our Carling Heights neighbours for a yard (and bake) sale. Fortunately for our neighbours, we enjoyed much better weather this year.

A mini-event compared to our Christmas bazaar; we nevertheless had a very successful day with sales exceeding last year by 33%. And coincidentally, the amount raised was almost identical to the ham and strawberry dinner; \$1,535 vs. \$1,537. What are the chances?!

Of special mention was a generous donation of "like new" books, DVD's and CD's received from a friend of the Barbers. Every available table was moved into the Mills Room to display the extraordinary number of books etc.

#### **Annual Christmas Bazaar**

At 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, November 22<sup>nd</sup>, we opened the doors to a throng of very eager shoppers and closed the doors behind the last customer at 1:00 p.m.

The book room once again found a home in The Mills Room. The bake and deli table in the Friendship Hall was a huge success. The baking was virtually a sell-out. The last jar of Merry Christmas jam was snapped up halfway through the morning; we are already planning an emergency jam session to replenish before Christmas.

Joanne advised that 54 hot dogs were served along with her homemade soup. Customers shopped and dined downstairs while enjoying our very own Piano Man, Glen Thompson.

Upstairs, the Christmas treasures received a boost from items donated by friends of the Thompsons who are downsizing. Rowntree's own craft tables were full, and we received many calls from crafters/vendors this year wishing to rent tables. Currently, we limit vendors to people who have a connection to Rowntree. This year Beth Brown and Mark Jolliffe were added to the list of crafting vendors. And the Toonie Table was not to be outshone, with over 40 items donated.

On the day, the bazaar grossed over \$4,500. After additional contributions and jam expenses, it is anticipated that we will be very close to, if not slightly over, last year's total of \$4,000.

Meeting and greeting was Rev Wendy Noble along





The United Church of Canada has unveiled an inspiring new initiative, **Toward 2035**, as part of its Centennial celebrations. This forward-looking vision and whole church strategy aims to honour the legacy of past generations while charting a bold path for the future.

In an open letter, which continues to roll out across the church, Rev. Michael Blair, General Secretary, emphasized the importance of this moment for reflection and imagination. Approved by the General Council Executive, the initiative began

with data-informed discussions among church leaders in late 2024.

**Toward 2035** envisions a future where the United Church thrives through a strong denominational identity characterized by cooperation and collaboration, better reflecting the diversity of Canadian communities. It aims to foster resilient and inspired communities of

disciples, accompanied by adaptive and effective ministry leaders, less burdened by property and governance requirements.


The initiative is a data-informed and connected approach to discernment and action to ensure the church's witness remains strong, transformative, and effective going forward.

As part of this effort, resources and discussion guides will be made available to facilitate conversations within communities of faith and church networks, as well as discussions at GC45 and in regional meetings in both spring and fall.

Rev. Blair invites all members to join in this transformative journey, praying for hope, joy, justice, and peace in a world that desperately needs them. Together, The United Church of Canada will continue to embody its call to Deep Spirituality, Bold Discipleship, and Daring Justice.
